A message from the Chair

I honestly don't know where this year has gone! I understand we have not sent out a newsletter since January, for which I apologise, but as we are forever saying, it has been a strange year.

We started out with all our New Year plans and almost immediately the second lockdown put pay to the Rowathon and Jigsaw competition. On emerging from "Purdah", we immediately launched into MS Awareness Week – this meant flag days and WOW (Wear Orange Wednesday). The Flag days were immensely successful, but WOW suffered from lack of forward publicity (see separate report).

We held our AGM in May and had a pleasing crowd, possibly spurred on by Dr Basil Ridha's attendance and Rosalyn's homemade bakes! Dr Ridha's talk was titled "How can we best work together?" and generated some interesting discussion.

We had planned a relaxed summer social in the middle of June, but this failed to attract enough interest (?Covid issues) and was cancelled. However, later that month MS had a stall at the Lieutenant Governors Fayre and the ducks in the pond were very popular (see separate report).

We had planned to hold the cancelled Jigsaw competition in the autumn, but bearing in mind the continued concerns around COVID, this has been postponed again till the spring. We have, however, purchased the jigsaws in preparation.

November, however, was suddenly very busy. We had the event at La Perla (see Rosalyn's report) on 8th November. Our Christmas Fayre was on Saturday 13th November. Footfall was a bit disappointing but nevertheless raised a good sum. Thank you to all those who came and helped on the day and those who baked, painted, constructed, sewed and stitched to bring items to sell. The following day the postponed Rowathon took place at the Indoor Fitness Centre at Hougue du Pommier. 17 teams participated and two of the ladies teams beat the previous ladies team record for the event. Thank you to all the teams who

puffed, panted and sweated on our behalf – you will have raised a lot of money for us. We also were privileged to see Simon Johns break the 24h solo rowing world record which he was finishing during our event.

The Round Table Charities Christmas Fayre has now sadly, but rightly, been cancelled, and so has our Children's Christmas party on 4th December – the latter however, will be rescheduled as an event in the New Year.

That's it for events this year, but we are already working on 2022.

In the meantime, there is some news regarding a neurologist. Dr Basil Ridha (locum neurologist for the last year) finished his contract at the beginning of October and returned to England. However, just as he was leaving he was approached by HR and has another 3 month contract to come over one week in four and maintain virtual contact in between to support MS advice on island. I understand that this has been organised while interviews take place in December for a permanent replacement.

Finally, I am stepping down as the Group Co-ordinator at the end of this year. The arrangements for my successor are just being finalised and that will be a surprise for 2022. Thank you for allowing me to work with you all over the last few years. I have some very happy memories.

Saffery Rotary Walk

I was asked to participate in the Saffery Rotary Walk with the primary purpose being to help raise awareness and funds as part of the Guernsey Disability Alliance (GDA) team representing our local branch of the Multiple Sclerosis (MS) Society.

I wasn't sure of the distance, had no idea what the weather would be like and didn't know about the bright orange T-shirts but knowing how important it is to raise awareness and funds I said yes. Luckily, I decided to enter for the GDA section only which meant that unknowingly, I had circumvented the 39 miles all island tour that many bravely had signed up for.

Family and friends were equally in awe that I had signed up as they had assumed I was doing the whole coastal walk. Saffery Rotary have recognised that for many, myself included, the time and dedication for training, the fitness level and sheer energy required meant that without relay teams, family walk initiatives and varying start points for those of us with physical and mental challenges it could not be accessible to all and as such, there would be less participation. Perhaps less sponsorship raised and perhaps less awareness. It is good to know that most members of our community could have the opportunity to consider participating. Including this year those in wheelchairs and those on crutches, the youngest participant was 11, the oldest 74 years old.

The 2021 Saffery Rotary Walk took place on Saturday 5th June starting at 4.30 am and not ending until 10 pm for some of those who circumvented the entire

distance. There were more than a thousand walkers which included 33 relay teams and 60 family groups making it a record breaking year for one of our island's largest charity fundraising events.

The MS team joined the GDA at Bordeaux and were warmly welcomed. Getting to the finish line took a little longer than expected but the atmosphere, encouragement and the weather were all amazing. We were highly distinguishable in our orange t-shirts and caps. Many thanks to everyone who took part and to all of those who supported the event.

The Guernsey Voluntary Service (GVS) made the most amazing sweet cup of tea that I was very grateful for as I tended to my blisters and contemplated the ride home.
